### A View from the *Crowe's Nest*

**There is something about a road trip that creates memories.**

Growing up, my family traveled a lot. One summer we packed into a tent camper and set off on an adventure across America. We visited some of our nation's most incredible places: the Dinosaur National Monument, Crazy Horse Memorial, Mount Rushmore, Yosemite, the Redwood Forest, the Alamo, Death Valley, the Grand Tetons, the Grand Canyon, the Badlands, and many other national treasures.

Looking back, those places were amazing. But what I remember most are often the unexpected moments along the way.

One of those memories happened at a small ice cream shop in the middle of nowhere. It was a scorching hot day, and after hours on the road our family of six decided to stop for ice cream. We all ordered, eagerly waiting for our treats to arrive.

A few minutes later, the waitress brought out two bowls of ice cream. Just two. After some confusion, my parents told the first two people to go ahead and eat before it melted. When they finished, the waitress collected the bowls and returned a few minutes later with two more servings. Then she repeated the process for the final two family members.

As it turned out, the little ice cream shop only had two bowls!

It wasn't one of the famous landmarks on our trip. It wasn't on any travel brochure. Yet decades later it remains one of my favorite memories.

Life is a lot like that.

We often focus on the destination and overlook the journey. We spend our time looking ahead to where we want to be instead of paying attention to what God is doing along the way.

This July we will begin a new sermon series called Road Trip: Getting Out of the Parking Lot. Through the stories of Jacob, Philip, Moses, and Ruth, we will discover that faith was never meant to sit still. God rarely gives us the whole map for the journey. More often, He invites us to trust Him with the next step.

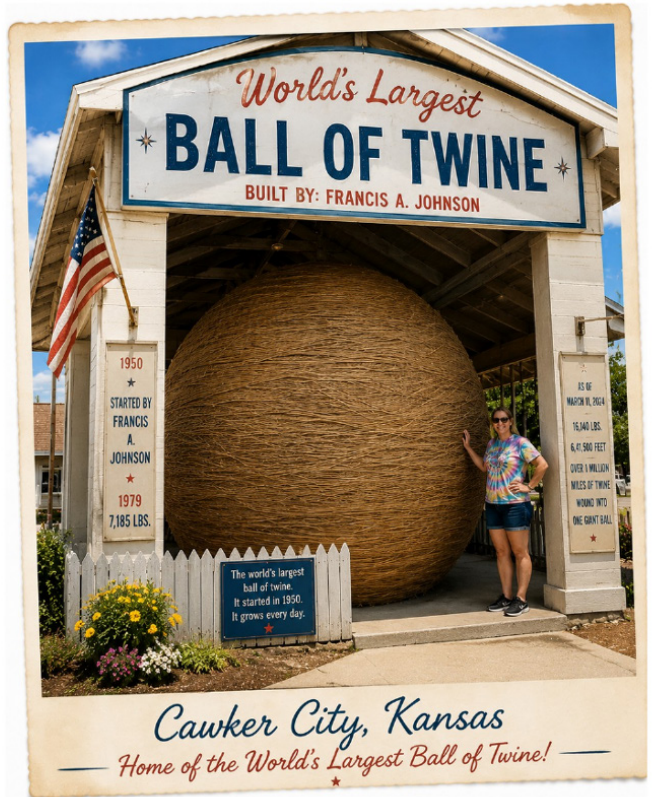

# 2026 North Georgia Annual Conference Report

The 2026 North Georgia Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church was held June 18–20, 2026, at The Classic Center in Athens, Georgia, with a clergy executive session on June 17. The conference theme was based on Matthew 25:37–40 (“whatever you did for one of the least of these...”), emphasizing ministry with and for people in need. I was blessed to represent JUMC as the church lay delegate.

The 2026 session continued the North Georgia Conference’s effort to strengthen local churches, support clergy and lay leadership, and align ministries around serving communities through the love and grace of Jesus Christ. The gathering combined worship, decision-making, accountability, and planning for the future ministry of United Methodists across North Georgia.

Throughout the three-day conference, delegates addressed:

Election of delegates to the 2028 General and Jurisdictional Conferences

The One Georgia Unification Report

Conference budget and financial matters

Nominations and leadership elections

Safe Sanctuaries updates

The Voting Rights Resolution and other submitted resolutions

Ordination and commissioning of clergy

Memorial recognitions and worship services

Budget Summary:

The District Treasurer and CFO report that the North Georgia District remains financially strong, with a healthy balance sheet and prudent reserves. The mission work of the local church remains the focus of the Conference, while also supporting the work of the General Church and the North Georgia Conference itself. The total number of North Georgia Conference churches was 408 21 including newly emerging congregations and missional churches. A total of 303 churches, or 22 74.3%, paid 100% of their apportionments in 2025

Ordination Actions:

Thursday evening brought the conference attendees together for a beautiful ordination service. During this service, candidates approved through the conference’s credentialing process were ordained as elders and deacons as well as recognized for licensing.

Unification:

Both the South and North Georgia Conferences voted to unify both conferences into one Georgia Conference. What’s next? A special session of the Southeastern Jurisdiction is expected to consider and approve the necessary conference boundary changes in August 2026. This step is required because annual conference boundaries are established at the jurisdictional level. Assuming all approvals are received, the new Georgia Annual Conference would officially begin on January 1, 2027. Conference boards, agencies, budgets, and administrative functions would transition into the new structure. The first regular session of the unified Georgia Annual Conference is planned for June 2027, when the new conference would conduct its normal 2026 North Georgia Annual Conference Report.

Annual business:

The Conference Treasurer and CFO report that apportionments are not set to be increased due to unification.

Service of Remembrance:

The Service of Remembrance was held Friday afternoon to honor clergy, clergy spouses, and lay leaders who have died since the previous annual conference.

Mission Updates:

The mission reports celebrated how North Georgia United Methodist churches are living out Christ’s call to serve “the least of these” through local and global outreach, disaster relief, community ministries, and discipleship efforts. Leaders reported ongoing efforts to strengthen partnerships, develop leaders, and expand the church’s impact while remaining focused on serving people in need with compassion, justice, and Christian witness. Wellroot is expanding their campus in order to provide services for more youth and families.

The Handbook for the 2026 Annual Conference is available for all to read on the North GA UMC website. There you’ll find more details regarding all of the business conducted during the session. It was an honor to represent JUMC at Annual Conference. I’m excited about the future of the one Georgia District and the work of the UMC.

## Got a dollar?



(This was the opening sermon by our Bishop Dease at the 2026 Annual Conference. It is an outstanding sermon. Please read it and hear her words. May it challenge and inspire you.)

Got a dollar? It's a question that we hear often. Sometimes it's asked by someone in need. Sometimes it's asked just to test us. But today, Jesus turns that question, "Got a dollar?" into a spiritual X-ray. Because in the kingdom of God, the question is never just about the dollar. It's about the heart behind the one giving it. Because that single

dollar, often overlooked, dropped in a jar, or spent without thought, carries a whole lot of weight—not just financial weight, but spiritual, moral, and communal significance.

Got a dollar? It's more than a question. It's an invitation to give, to see, to love. It's a question that I had to ask in my own life when I was a seminary student in Washington, D.C. And I want you to know Lori Muller knows this story because my seminary professor remembered it over thirty years ago and just happened to share it with her.

I decided to hop on a bus to treat myself to dinner and a movie. I got on the subway train, and when I got off and reached the restaurant, I realized that my wallet had been pickpocketed. Ooh. And I'm new to D.C., and for you young delegates, they didn't have cell phones back then.

But it would cost only a dollar for me to get back on campus to the seminary. And I'm in a high-rent district Chevy Chase, Maryland, if any of you know that area and I thought that if I stood in front of Saks Fifth Avenue, Neiman Marcus, or Bloomingdale's, I knew I could get a dollar from someone there and get back on the bus.

Because it was cold. Not Atlanta cold. Up-in-New-York cold. Washington, D.C. cold. It would have taken me two hours to walk back. So I began begging for about an hour, maybe an hour and fifteen minutes, as people were trying to get to their cars.

"Excuse me, do you have a dollar? I just want to get back home. Can you spare a dollar?" Then I thought, "Well, maybe if I tell them I'm at the seminary, studying to be a pastor, they would see and understand..." Shoot, please. They didn't even know what seminary was.

Begging strips a person of the illusion that they are seen and valued and safe. It forces someone to rely on the mercy of people who may or may not give a damn. No one should have to beg for what God created them to deserve: food and safety and dignity and justice and belonging.

So they kept walking past me. Some wouldn't even look at me. Some ignored me. And here is what I learned: The more that you move up, the less you look back. Because comfort dulls memory. Hear me.

Once people breathe easier, they forget what it feels like to gasp for air. Even in the church, we leaders rise and forget the pews that formed us. Churches grow and forget the neighborhoods that surround them because success dulls compassion. Society advances and forgets the ones who labored to make advancement possible because distance erases memory.

Yeah. Got a dollar? The question confronts our comfort, our assumptions, and our hearts.

My friends, this sermon is not about guilt. It's about grace. It's about dignity and the radical love of Christ. Jesus' promise in Luke—the scripture that was just read for your hearing is not a financial formula. It's a spiritual invitation. It's a radical reorientation of power, discipleship, and leadership.

Yeah. Every dollar is a test of our stewardship. When we cling to resources, we shrink our imagination. But when we release what we have our time, our compassion, our influence, our dollars yes, we participate in God's economy, where gifts circulate, dignity is restored, and communities flourish.

Friends, this is a call for you and me to lead differently. It's a call to see the least of these not as recipients of

our generosity, but partners in a shared liberation. Yeah. To build ministries where resources flow toward those who need them most and to cultivate congregations where generosity is not an obligation, but a spiritual practice.

When we give to the least of these, we are not filling a gap in someone else's life. We are healing the fractures in our own. Yeah. Having money. Having money, church, does not mean we're vital. Let us not confuse wealth with worth. Yeah.

The least of these are not just those who have nothing. They are those whose voices have been muted, whose bodies have been burdened, and whose futures have been deferred. So when we serve the least of these, we are not stepping down from a place of abundance. We are stepping into a place where Christ already stands.

Yeah. Because when the poor rise, the whole community rises. When justice rolls down like water, it washes over every single one of us. Do you know that in this month alone, five hundred people will be evicted from their homes in Atlanta? And I'm just talking about Atlanta proper.

So that Friday night, standing on the corner, begging for a dollar, after a little over an hour, from the shadows came a homeless man who handed me a dollar. And I was scared of him. I didn't know what he was going to do. I didn't know. And here he was following behind me, and he hands me a dollar. Then he goes back across the street and lays down on a bench, which was his home.

Here was a brother with no possessions, but a heart full of grace. "Sister, go home." His helping reminded me that generosity is not charity. It is a spiritual practice of remembering that my well-being is bound up with yours. Yeah. And that abundance is revealed only when we share. For two weeks I went back to that bench so I could give him twenty dollars for what he did for me that night. And I never saw him again.

Maybe he was an angel. Maybe it was a holy encounter at the margins. Because God tends to show up where you and I, and society, often avoid. Maybe it was a divine interruption. Because the person that you and I pass may be the person that God is sending to you. Maybe, just maybe, he was a reminder to me to look back no matter how far I rise and to resist the altitude sickness of leadership.

From that day on, almost thirty years ago, I made a commitment to keep dollar bills in my car. Because if I can remind someone they are seen, even with just a dollar, then I've done something good today.

My friends, charity can be a form of distance, but solidarity is a form of discipleship. Solidarity means, as the late Pope Francis said, that the shepherds smell like the sheep. You and I must begin to smell like the sheep.

Hear me now, clergy and laity. To smell like the sheep means you've been where they are in the briars, in the cold, in the confusion, and in the joy. Because if we are not close enough to smell like the people we serve, we are not close enough to lead them.

So may we resist the fear that tells us we do not have it to give. To see the poor as partners is to trust that God has placed gifts in every single community and that the church's role is not to deliver Christ to the poor, but to discover Christ among them.

So, as we gather throughout these next few days, may we remember that God is not waiting for us in the safety of our sanctuaries, but in the faces of the ones the world has forgotten.

Because this is the work that will shape the future of the United Methodist Church in Georgia and beyond. Not charity, but covenant. Not pity, but partnership. Not distance, but shared liberation.

And so now, this benediction.

Go now and serve until the kingdom of God comes on earth as it is in heaven. May it be so in your life and ministry, and may it be so in mine.

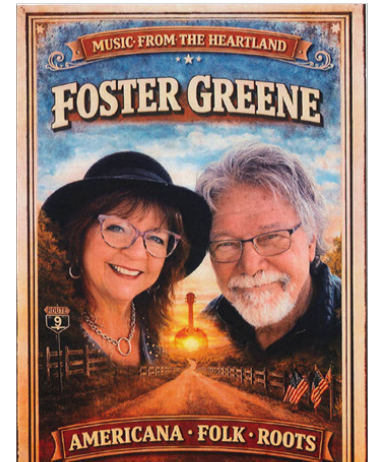
